The Historist position and some futurists see the Laodicean church as one describing the church from the mid-eighteen-hundreds to present (starting with Hegel and Darwin). It is the socially liberal church that places science, psychology, evolutionary theory, secular sociology and anthropology, over and above the Scriptures or at least on par with it, often even denying it. It is the social gospel church that promotes social justice and social welfare but disconnects or confuses it with the true gospel of repenting from sin and coming

to a saving knowledge of Jesus. It is the church of good works without the good God or the good news. It runs alongside the Philadelphian church of the true gospel.

The Preterist simply holds that this church was a historical church that had a short-lived life and died out. While the Idealist would say that this is picture of the universal struggle that all Christians have in their walk with Jesus. Sometimes they are on fire for God; other times they are cold and distant. But Jesus loves them and is constantly calling them back to himself.
